Chief Dubord spoke on the mass casualty report, stating our legal representative and policy analyst are reviewing this and will bring forward any modifications and/or changes to the Board in the fall.

In response to Board inquiries, it was noted that:

- All front-line officers are trained for low value cybercrime as they are the first contact with the complainant. DPD's Cyber experts have created a document with a checklist for the front-line officers as well as exploring an app for officers.
- DPD continues to track the stats on walk ins, online reporting and calls received. Online reporting has increased 31% in March. The DPD call takers initiated 550 calls for service in March.
- DPD Bend don't Break podcast has 75,000 downloads and is currently in the top 3 Law Enforcement Podcasts in Canada.
- DPD will be conducting a staffing review, which will also encompass the Community police stations activity level comparing the resourcing and value.

NEWS RELEASE: DEMAND FOR 9-1-1 SURGES AHEAD OF THE SUMMER, WITH 21% MORE CALLS IN 2023

June 14, 2023

Emergency call volumes will not be cooling down as B.C. temperatures rise

Vancouver, B.C.—E-Comm is managing extraordinary 9-1-1 call volumes this year, with the volume of requests for emergency services already exceeding those of the heat dome in 2021. The emergency communications centre is expecting an exceptionally busy summer and is urging British Columbians to help protect its critical 9-1-1 resources by using the system responsibly.

E-Comm has seen a 21 per cent increase in 9-1-1 calls in the first five months of 2023, relative to the same period last year, with May marking the busiest month in E-Comm's history. There were 39 per cent more calls to 9-1-1 in May 2023, compared to May 2022, and the company is forecasting high call volumes throughout the summer.

Extreme heat and wildfires have historically impacted 9-1-1 call volumes, and the return of pre-COVID activities including tourism, social gatherings and events are also likely contributors to the increased demand for emergency services. An April update to the Android operating system has also contributed to a global increase in auto-dialed false 9-1-1 calls, a problem which cellular phone manufacturers are working to address in a new update to be downloaded to phones throughout June.

"We have never seen 9-1-1 call volumes this high," says Oliver Grüter-Andrew, President & CEO of E-Comm. "Despite increasing demands for emergency services, we have continued to meet our service level targets for emergency response this year, thanks to the heroic efforts of our staff who work tirelessly around the clock to keep our communities safe. We have implemented a number of improvements that have helped prepare us for the busy summer ahead, but we still need British Columbians' help to keep 9-1-1 lines free for emergencies only."

In light of the <u>record-breaking number of calls to 9-1-1</u>, E-Comm is sharing its top tips for protecting emergency resources.

Tips to protect 9-1-1


1. Only call 9-1-1 when immediate emergency assistance is required from police, fire or ambulance. Visit <u>ecomm911.ca</u> for specific examples of when to call.

2. Know your location in case you need to call 9-1-1. An exact address is always best, but your city, cross streets and major landmarks will also help us find you faster.


3. Carry your phone carefully to prevent pocket dials to 9-1-1, and know your phone's safety functions – many phones have automatic 9-1-1 call-dial features including "fall detection" and Emergency SOS that result in false calls. If you do call us by accident, do NOT hang up. Please stay on the line so we can ensure you are safe.

Dear Chief Dubord,

I wanted to take a moment to thank your members for the job they have done in supporting myself, my family and my business through a harassment, stalking and vandalism case. This 5 month experience of being targeted has been very distressing and disturbing with the perpetrator eventually finding where I live and targeting my wife and daughter. To say we have felt traumatized is an understatement but through this unsettling journey the members have been professional, responsive, kind and compassionate.

I want to give compliment to Cst Ransom, Cst Loepeky, Cst West, Cst Askan and Cst Einhorn for the fantastic job they have done. Each has made myself and my family feel heard and safe. One member really stood out in the way she created space for my family to be heard, took the time to hear all the facts, never made us feel awkward or silly for our concerns. She really took action and we felt cared for. This person is Cst Taylor Einhorn, she was a pleasure to work with and my wife and I want to extend our deepest gratitude to her and heartfelt appreciation. In the end she did what needed to be done to provide some measure of safety for our family for which I am deeply appreciative.

Thank you Cst Einhorn - you have a bright career ahead of you and maybe one day you will be working with my son. (Chief Dubbed, you met my son

In the end this has been a very disturbing experiences for which we are getting support and it was made much easier to navigate because of the Delta Police members and their action and care. Kind regards

Good evening chief

Thanks so much for getting back to me. I know you must be very busy but I felt like I had to reach out after discovering your podcast.

I have only been a BC CO for the past six weeks, prior to that I did a short stint as a Fish and Wildlife Officer not far from Edmonton, was in the Calgary Police Service for twelve years, a paratrooper in the British Army and eight years in the South African Police Service (where I grew up). I have been the subject officer in two OISs in Canada, one in 2011 and the latest in 2018. I have had many other relevent experiences that tie into all of this but this isn't the forum to subject you to my life story. What is relevent is how I seemed to be able to work through multiple critical incidents early in my career versus my experience post 2018.

The first episode of your podcast I listened to was "The Cost of Confidentiality". Having just come out of a four year ASIRT investigation this episode was **incredibly** impactful for me. I don't mind admitting that I had to pull over twice while listening just to compose myself after hearing what your officers went through on this one and how eerily similar it was to my experiences. Chief, I had no idea that there were others that felt the way I did whilst under investigation and were impacted in the same manner. Even recalling the feeling I had listening to their story a few short weeks ago is causing me an emotional reaction as I type this.

I immediately downloaded all of your other episodes and started listening from the beginning. I still have a home in Alberta that we are in the process of selling, so I spend a lot of time on the road listening to podcasts and audiobooks. I listened to the first episode with Aaron Hill and was taken aback with similarities with my life experiences and the impact incidents (and their aftermath) have had on my well being. The first episode about the Starlight Casino shooting

hit me hard. You released that exactly a week before I shot a driver who was crushing my partner against our police car on Christmas Day in 2018. I cannot overstate this enough: I would give my life savings to be able to go back to early 2019 and listen then to that episode and what Jordan MacWilliams experienced and how he came through it all. I honestly had no idea it wasn't just me fighting those **exact** same issues. There were many, many times over the subsequent few years where I thought I was completely alone in my experiences and would not be able to survive what was happening much longer.

I could go on and on. There have been so many moments listening to you and your guests that have caused me such a flood of emotion that I actually feel so disappointed that I didn't know about you sooner. You have touched on so many topics that I thought were just in my imagination prior to now.

I have much more I want to share and ask you but I have to fight the tendency to write ridiclously lengthly e-mails. Chief, **thank you so incredibly much** for what you have done and continue to do with this podcast.
