


DELTA CRIME MAP - SEPTEMBER 2021






DISTRICT 1 CRIME MAP - SEPTEMBER 2021




















DISTRICT 4 CRIME MAP - SEPTEMBER 2021



Subject: E-Comm Services Update

E-Comm 911 (E-Comm) provides emergency and non-emergency call-taking and dispatching services to the Delta Police Department (DPD). To ensure standardized and responsive call-taking services for Delta citizens, the DPD established service standards for E-Comm to answer 88% of emergency calls within ten seconds and 80% of non-emergency calls with three minutes.

Unfortunately, E-Comm has not consistently been able meet the established service standards. The DPD is aware that some Delta citizens have experienced long wait times to speak with an E-Comm call-taker, especially on the non-emergency line and have expressed their concerns to the DPD about the delays. E-Comm has noted that insufficient budgeting and associated staffing levels have contributed to the delays.

The DPD remains committed to working with E-Comm to ensure that service level targets for Delta can be met, providing timely response to a citizen, whether they are in an emergency or non-emergency situation. Other options to alleviate the delays are also being considered including the promotion of the online reporting system.

Indigenous Land Acknowledgment: E-mail Signature

RECOMMENDATION:

PURPOSE:

To recommend that the Delta Police Board adopt an Indigenous Land Acknowledgement (Land Acknowledgement) for optional use in Board e-mail signatures.

DISCUSSION:

In June 2021, the Delta Police Board approved for a Land Acknowledgement to be read before any public meetings, presentations or celebrations in Delta that the Board hosts. The Land Acknowledgement of traditional territory serves to display respect and recognition for the First Nations groups that once inhabited or currently inhabit the lands upon which the meeting is being held.

Similarly, as a sign of respect and recognition, many organizations have begun using Land Acknowledgements in e-mail signatures. The Delta Police Department (DPD), too, in September 2021, adopted this practice. A member of the Delta Police Board has also brought forward a request for optional utilization of the Land Acknowledgement in Board e-mail signature.

This continued recognition of First Nations presence is an essential element in establishing meaningful relationships with our community partners and paving the path toward reconciliation. The Land Acknowledgement being proposed for e-mail signatures comes from the original Land Acknowledgement that the Board currently uses to initiate meetings/events and was developed by the DPD with the input and approval of the Tsawwassen and Musqueam First Nations.

Subject: Alexa's Team Recipients 2020

In 2009, the Middelaer family created the Alexa's Team in partnership with the BC Road Safety Foundation and ICBC. Alexa's Team is a recognition program named in honour of four-year-old Alexa Middelaer, who was killed in 2008 by an impaired driver in Delta. Alexa's Team recognizes police officers for their dedication and efforts to take impaired drivers off BC roads. Officers who complete a minimum of 12 alcohol and/or drug-impaired driving investigations in a single year are added to the Team.

Six Delta Police officers were named to the Alexa's Team for 2020, including Constables Ganesh Krishnan, Brandon Orser, Nav Bring, Scott McClure and Acting Sergeant Grayson Smith. ¹

Collectively, the DPD officers named to the 2020 Alexa's Team took over 138 impaired drivers off Delta's roads. By taking these drivers off the roads, DPD officers averted potential crashes, prevented individuals from sustaining devastating injuries and most importantly, saved families from having to face the excruciating pain of losing a loved one, just as Alexa Middelaer's family did.

Road safety continues to emerge as one of the top priorities for our community, as the DPD has learned through community consultations and outreach. I am proud of the dedication and commitment of the DPD team to road safety in our community and contributions to Alexa's legacy.

Subject: Understanding the Use of Personal Pronouns – Being Inclusive

The below information is intended to provide a general understanding of the use of personal pronouns to be inclusive, as requested by the Board. I do want to note that I am not an expert but continue to learn about the use of personal pronouns.

The use of correct personal pronouns enables people to feel seen for who they are. The most common pronouns are: she/her, he/him, and they/them. Consider how we no longer hear the expression "*I don't see colour*" because it implies that, as a white individual, in this case, the individual doesn't see the perspectives of those who look different. It implies that the individual doesn't see the struggles of others, either.

Most Canadians were raised with the understanding that when they meet someone new, they should address them as "sir" or "ma'am" to be respectful, or perhaps "Ms. so-and-so or Mr. so-and-so." This thinking is not wrong, provided you know the individual that you are talking to. This is why it is also important not to assume someone's gender identity – be it in person, by phone, or e-mail.

The same is true for personal pronouns. Addressing a crowd "good morning ladies and gentleman" could exclude someone who doesn't identify as either, but "good morning everyone" hits the mark. At times, by trying to be respectful, polite, courteous, or formal, based on previous cultural norms, can have the opposite effect in modern settings. And that is why it is essential to remember intent versus impact. While the intent is likely not to offend, the impact may do just that.

We have seen the use of pronouns in various professional settings, such as e-mail signature, Zoom usernames, business cards, meeting plackets etc. The use of personal pronouns in such settings is to avoid asking one's pronoun, which is not polite. Thus, offering it ahead of time shows courtesy.

And, if you make a mistake: Apologize, Correct, Try Again (ACT). The Trans community, specifically, has said that if one is seen as trying, they are likely to outperform what is expected of them. Thus, this is a win-win scenario.

A general rule of thumb: if someone introduces themselves as "Ted" – call them "Ted" – one generally cannot go wrong with calling someone by the name they give.

Online Reporting - One Year Update

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT the Delta Police Board receive this report for information.

PURPOSE:

To provide an update on the Delta Police Department's (DPD) Online Reporting system.

DISCUSSION:

On October 1, 2020, the Delta Police Department (DPD) launched an Online Reporting (OR) tool for the community to file electronic reports on non-emergency matters. The OR system aims to provide flexibility and options in reporting crime and enhances efficiency within DPD operations.

The OR system is somewhat restrictive in the types of reports it accepts and currently only accepts :

- Vandalism
- Fraud under \$5000
- Lost Property
- Found Property
- Community Concern
- Traffic Incident

The OR system adds value to the DPD's "No Call Too Small" philosophy that the community expects and that the DPD prides itself on as it's a mechanism of convenience for the community to let us know about the little things. All calls for service reported through the OR system are reviewed and dispatched for officer attendance. The OR system provides another communication tool for the public to connect with DPD. The flow of a call through the OR system is the same as a call to the non-emergency line and no reports will be concluded digitally.

During the first year of operation (October 1, 2020 to September 30, 2021), the DPD received 255 online crime reports. 46 of these reports were received in the last quarter of 2020 and 209 were received from January to September 2021, with an average of 23 reports received monthly.
